Incorporating laughter into daily life, through humour, spending time with people who make you laugh, watching cartoon films and videos significantly improves our overall health.



Nursery students discover that mathematics can be both enjoyable and essential in everyday life.

Language: Exploring Through Hands-On Activities

Nursery students eagerly develop language skills through activities emphasizing speaking, listening, and visual communication. These activities introduce the sounds associated with letters, objects, and symbols, enabling children to recognize similar sounds in words.

Interactive activities like letter puzzles, beanbag tosses, and themed games such as "feeding the monkey" (tagged with letter M items) make learning dynamic and memorable. Creative activities for the letter P include running a "Pizza Parlour," flipping pancakes to find hidden Ps, and organizing popcorn parties with pastamaking sessions. Such tasks enhance collaborative learning while embedding letter recognition.

Language skills empower children to describe their surroundings, initiate conversations, and ask questions. Visual language, encompassing pictures, symbols, and illustrations, helps children interpret and understand meaning. Early writing experiences teach them that their marks—whether letters, shapes, or symbols convey significance. Activities combining visual and written communication stimulate creativity and reinforce engagement with language.

Through these interactive experiences, students enjoy learning while building a strong foundation in communication skills. This prepares them to explore and connect with the world around them, fostering a lifelong love for learning.


Basketball Is The Sport I Love the Most

Adventure In Assessments

At our school, assessments are an opportunity for students to demonstrate their learning in ways that are fun, engaging, and relatable. This hands-on approach is aligned with the IB curriculum's philosophy of assessing understanding and progress in meaningful ways.

Recently, our Grade 1 students embarked on a thrilling treasure hunt adventure that wasn't just a game; it was a carefully planned activity designed to enhance their skills in addition and subtraction, recognizing odd and even numbers, understanding tens and units, and writing number names. This activity turned learning into a fun, immersive experience full of role-playing and exploration.

The journey began with the students becoming brave sailors. They waded into a pretend sea to retrieve floating sailor bottles. Each bottle contained a rolled-up message- a math challenge with addition and subtraction problems. Students eagerly opened the bottles, solved the sums, and recorded their answers to unlock the next clue for the treasure hunt. Their problem-solving and thinking skills were put to the use as they navigated these first challenges with excitement. The second stop was an island of golden sand, where students transformed into explorers. Digging into the sand, they uncovered slips of paper with numbers written on them and categorized them as even or odd, a hands-on activity that engaged their understanding of number properties while simulating the thrill of a real discovery. Next, the explorers used 'magic' blocks to tackle a tens-and-units challenge. They selected a number from the sand slips and built its representation by placing blocks under the correct tens or units column. This creative activity helped reinforce place value concepts. With their models complete, students unlocked the final stage of their adventure. At last, they arrived at the treasure chest, filled with glittering coins. Each coin had a one- or two-digit number inscribed on it. Acting as treasure hunters, students picked a coin and wrote its number name. After completing all the tasks, they celebrated by receiving their well-earned prizes!

Through this imaginative and interactive experience, students didn't just solve math problems—they embodied becoming inquirers, exploring clues and uncovering solutions. They were risk-takers, taking on challenges confidently, and thinkers, using logical reasoning to work through each task.

Differentiation: Nurturing Growth At Every Pace In The Kindergarten Classroom

In our classrooms, differentiation is not just a teaching strategy but a core principle that ensures that children progress at their own pace and achieve their full potential. By tailoring our instruction to meet the diverse needs, abilities, and learning styles of our students, we create an inclusive and dynamic environment where every learner is supported and challenged in the most effective way possible.

Numeracy:

In numeracy, when teaching **quantification**, students are provided hands-on experiences using manipulatives like counters, blocks, or beads to help students understand counting and numbers in a tangible way. For those who are ready for more abstract thinking, we may move to exercises involving 'greater and lesser than' comparisons, asking them to identify which number is greater or lesser in a group of objects or on a number line.

When exploring **shapes**, students engage with activities that range from matching shapes to simple shape identification to creating their own shapes using building blocks. For some, this involves recognizing and naming basic shapes. while others may move on to understanding properties such as the number of sides or angles.

Time is another concept that we introduce through differentiated activities. The analog clock is used in various ways by different students to learn how to tell time. By providing various levels of challenge, from basic counting to skip counting by 2's and 5's, all students are given opportunities to strengthen their numeracy skills .To build fluency in **skip counting by 2's and 5's**, we offer activities such as counting with number lines, songs, or group counting games, where children can visually see the patterns or jump forward in numbers as a group.



In literacy, for **reading**, students engage with activities that match their individual abilities. Some children work on **CVC** (**consonant-vowel-consonant**) words while others begin reading simple **digraph words**.

In **writing**, we focus on key skills like **CVC and digraph word writing**, where students practise spelling and writing words with controlled structures. They move from writing simple words to framing sentences using those words.

Unit of Inquiry (UOI):

Differentiation is equally important in the **Unit of Inquiry (UOI)**, where we dive deep into global concepts, including **community** and **celebration**. We provide differentiated opportunities for learning. Some children may work on drawing and labelling different people or structures they see, while others engage in role-play, acting out different community roles like teachers, doctors, or shopkeepers. Those who are ready for further exploration might be involved in discussions about the responsibilities of each community member and how they contribute to the greater good.

Similarly, when exploring **celebration**, we cater to different learning styles. Some children create art projects representing various cultural or personal celebrations, while others engage in storytelling, sharing what they know about different kinds of celebrations around the world.

By offering multiple entry points into learning, students not only develop academic knowledge but also enhance their emotional and social growth. Differentiation in the classroom empowers every child to participate in meaningful ways, reinforcing the idea that learning is both individualized and interconnected. At Genesis Global School, we are committed to fostering an inclusive environment that celebrates every child's unique learning journey, ensuring that they not only succeed academically but also develop the skills and mindset necessary for lifelong learning.






