In today's tech-heavy, fast-paced world, we often forget to lay our attention towards the older generation who still wants to play, talk, be heard and wants their minds to be challenged.

As people grow older, their bodies and minds undergo natural changes bringing in challenges with memory, coordination, balance, and fine motor skills. These changes can make them feel limited or disconnected. But when a child invites a grandparent to play, it doesn't just brighten their day—it strengthens bodies, sharpens minds, and heals hearts on both sides.

At our school, we believe in learning beyond books. And what better way than through play that includes the gentle wisdom of our elders and the vibrant energy of our children?

Here are age-appropriate games and playful moments designed to nurture skills and bonds across generations:

Nursery And Kindergarten

(Focus: Sensory play, social bonding, gross motor coordination)

Scarf Dance: Holding colourful scarves and moving to music helps improve movement for elders and rhythm for children.

What's in the Bag? Guess the hidden object by touch. Enhances sensory exploration and vocabulary.

Ring the Cone: A simple ring toss game for hand-eye coordination and gentle movement.



Grade 1-2

(Focus: Memory, fine motor skills, and communication)

Memory Tray: Observe, remember, and recall the items in the tray together. Great for boosting cognitive recall for all ages.

Balloon Volleyball: Light, safe, and laughter-filled—promotes balance and team bonding.

Colour and Shape Hopscotch: A vibrant hop-and-name game for movement and recall.



Grade 3-4

(Focus: Imagination, turn-taking, and fine motor coordination)

Story Chain: One starts a story, the other continues. Builds imagination, sequencing, and connection.

Chair Bowling: Plastic bottles and a soft ball become tools of fun and coordination—accessible for all.

Then and Now Art: Draw or paint the past and present together—homes, games, or schools. Builds emotional connection and respect.



Grade 5

(Focus: Leadership, empathy, and cultural exchange)

Reverse Roles: Children teach a modern game; grandparents share a traditional one. A celebration of old and new.

Yoga Buddies: Simple poses done together promote mindfulness, flexibility, and joint health.

Custom Memory Match: Use of family photos or household objects to create own matching card game. A beautiful way to revisit memories and learn family history.

Why This Matters

These aren't just games. They're tools for healing, growth, and connection. They offer time—real, undistracted time—to connect and care.

Let us build bridges between generations—one hop, one laugh, one story at a time. Because when a child and a grandparent play together, it's not just a game—it's a celebration of life across time.

An Eclipse is when light received from a celestial body is partially or totally cut-off because another such body has moved into a blocking position. A 'Lunar Eclipse' takes place when Earth moves into a straight line with and between the Sun and the Moon. If, on the other hand, the Moon comes between Earth and the Sun, we have a 'Solar Eclipse', i.e. the Moon's Shadow falls on Earth.

Do You Know Where 'Nothing' Is Important

'Nothing' is a very important part of mathematics. We represent NOTHING by '0', the symbol for zero. The old Roman numerals did not have a symbol for zero. This made calculations complicated. Nowadays we rarely use Roman numerals, except of some watch-faces and tombstones. The symbol '0' was invented in India, 2000 years ago.
